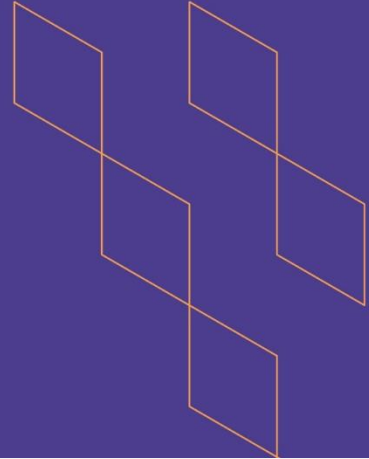

#### 4. Course general Description

ENG 431, **Poetry**, starts with a **synopsis of poetry, literary devices, and elements** along with an overview of its main genres: **lyric, dramatic, and narrative**. The course aims at studying certain poetic genres and forms to demonstrate understanding of the poems and poets (both British and American) in their historical, social, cultural, and literary contexts. It incorporates a variety of **poems (selected British and American poems)** from different genres and periods and intends to develop students' ability to critically appreciate (interpret and evaluate) the poetry while applying different critical approaches to the study of poetry. Further, the course intends to assist learners produce and evaluate their creative and analytical writing.

The main objective of this course is to define, at length, poetry, literary devices, and elements along with an overview of its main genres: lyric, dramatic, and narrative while selecting a variety of poems from different genres and periods, both British and American, to critically appreciate (interpret and evaluate) the poetry.
