Pharmacy Code of Ethics

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Ethics of professional conduct for pharmacy student:

Ethics are defined as directives derived from values and principles, and are concerned with how to behave appropriately for a healthcare provider when undertaking the profession.

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Principles of ethical behavior for pharmacists in their relationships with patients, other health care providers, and with society in general, through their daily practice of the profession of pharmacy.

Pharmacists: are healthcare provider who help patients make the best use of their medication. Ethics of professional conduct for pharmacy student has been developed by pharmacists aiming to lay down foundations and principles for the rules and responsibilities of pharmacists based on ethical and professional obligations. It aims to guide pharmacists in the best way to build relationships with patients, healthcare professionals, and the community. Ethical for pharmacy students focuses on:

- 1. That the pharmacist respects the inherited relationship between the patient and the pharmacist.
- 2. The pharmacist should provide what is in the best interest of each patient with concern, compassion, and privacy.
- 3. The pharmacist respects the independence and dignity of each patient.
- 4. The pharmacist should act with honesty and integrity in his professional relationships.
- 5. The pharmacist must adhere to professional competence.
- 6. The pharmacist respects the values and capabilities of his colleagues and other health professionals.
- 7. The pharmacist should serve the needs of the individual and society.
- 8. The pharmacist should seek fairness in distributing health resources.
- 9. The pharmacist Cooperate with the rest of the medical team to provide the best health care for individuals and society in general.

- 10. The pharmacist should respect and protect the confidentiality of information obtained during the period of providing pharmaceutical care, and to strive not to divulge it, unless the patient agrees to this or in some exceptional cases.
- 11. Compliance with and application of rules, regulations and standards related to the profession, and work to provide medicines from reliable official sources, including transportation and storage channels.
